Conservation Tips and Tricks

There are many ways a household can look to eliminate wasteful consumption of utilities; this includes not only water, but electricity, garbage, etc. Much of our waste is the result of habits we develop over the years, while other causes of waste involve outdated appliances and deferred maintenance.

Appliances

Newer appliances are much more efficient than they were in years past. For instance, newer dishwashers not only use less water, but less electricity. Whether or not your dishwasher is new or old, we advise that you avoid running a dishwasher that isn't full. This will consume even less water than if you washed them by hand and is a great conservation technique.

In March of last year, we shared the comparison of water consumption between toilets manufactured prior to 1992 and those manufactured after. Upon learning that the toilets at the district office were manufactured prior to 1992, district staff replaced them with dual-flush, water-saving toilets and installed them in-house. Replacing a toilet is easy to do, takes less than half an hour, and costs around \$100. District staff chose to do this in their own homes too!

Remember that appliances, while expensive, are major contributors to conservation. A minor leak in a faucet or toilet can waste gallons of water and can often be a simple fix.

General Manager's Report

A Very Fond Farewell



In 2018 I was hired on as the General Manager of Hartstene Pointe Water-Sewer District (HPWSD). Upon my hire I was tasked with facilitating a transition from contracted employees to regular employees. This involved establishing all related policies and

procedures and hiring certified, well-trained staff to perform administrative tasks, routine maintenance, leak repair and day-to-day operations. I was also charged with developing the District's first ever Asset Management Plan, Strategic Plan and Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs). While these tasks were not easy, they represent significant leaps forward in the growth and maturity of the District.

At one of my first Board of Commissioner meetings, the Board President at the time expressed the desire not to just improve operations, but become an example for all other small districts to follow. I am proud to say that as a result of the above vison, the District is now viewed as an industry leader for small Districts. We have been commended by the Washington Association of Sewer and Water District's, Evergreen Rural Water, the Infrastructure Assistance Coordinating Council, the Pacific Northwest subsection of the American Water Works Association and the State Auditor's Office. This is in large part thanks to the commitment of Commissioners past and present who refused settle for the status quo and instead aimed for excellence and professionalism.

As a direct result of your Commissioner's unrelenting pursuit of excellence, our operations have never run more smoothly than they do today and our working knowledge of our infrastructure is more accurate than it has ever been. We now have a plan in place to replace the District's ailing underground utilities and are in the process of implementing that plan. We have a dedicated staff that takes great pride in delivering the highest quality service possible. To say that this level of operations is rare among small districts is an understatement as many small districts are merely trying to keep their heads above water and struggling to meet regulatory demands.

Cyber Security Audit Update

The District's Cyber Security audit is in full swing and we've learned a lot about the integrity of the District's network systems. Throughout the month of March, we have worked with I.T. auditors from the State Auditor's Office, holding regular video meetings, securely providing network diagrams and other information. A team of three visited the District's facilities on March 24th and spent the day performing network scanning and touring the appropriate facilities. So far, SAO is pleased with the results.

Their audit is nearing completion and we expect a full report of the current state of our I.T. infrastructure and a report of suggestions in April. Due to the sensitive nature of identifying vulnerabilities in our systems, this report cannot be published, but we will share some details with discretion in next month's newsletter.

Overall, this audit has been helpful in discovering what we could improve upon, but it has also been helpful to learn that the District has a high level of security already.
